

DONATIONS AND TRANSFERS //

The D'Youville college archives welcomes donations of materials that document the history and evolution of the college from administrators, faculty, staff, students, alumni, and the general public. Materials of particular interest include records of student organizations and social clubs (including founding documents, minutes, reports, publications, and photographs), records of academic programs and schools, college publications (programs, flyers, newsletters), faculty and staff biographical records, and documentation of life at D'Youville (scrapbooks, diaries, letters, and photographs).

DONATIONS //

Donations are considered gifts to the archives, and donors will be asked to sign a deed of gift document acknowledging transfer of owner-ship to the archives. The archives collects materials in all formats, including paper, photographs, memorabilia, audio/visual materials and electronic records.

TRANSFERRING COLLEGE RECORDS //

The college archives acquires and preserves institutional records of administrators, departments, schools, faculty and staff. The college archivist is available for consultation to determine the historic and research value of records, as well as for transfer of records to the archives.

Collections

GREY NUNS //
D'Youville College was
founded by the Grey Nuns in
1907. Although the official archives of
the Grey Nuns of the Sacred Heart are held
in Yardley, Pa., the college archives does collect
histories of the Grey Nuns, as well as biographies of
St. Marguerite and Mother Bruyere, foundress of the
Grey Nuns of Ottawa. There are also several theses
on the history of D'Youville as well as Sister Mary
Sheila Driscoll's pamphlet series on the history of the
college.

VERTICAL FILE //

The archives maintains A to Z subject files of topics, events, and people related to D'Youville College (the "vertical file"). Materials contained in each file vary, but can include images, correspondence, brochures, and clippings.



COLLEGE RECORDS //

The largest collection in the archives, college records document the history and evolution of D'Youville from its beginnings in 1908 to the present. Materials are arranged by record groups, which include administration, academic programs, departments and offices, evaluation, facilities, faculty, institutional advancement, affiliated organizations and projects, students, memorabilia, and media.

PICTURE GALLERY //

An extensive collection of over 1,000 photographs covering D'Youville history.

RARE BOOKS //

Comprising over 250 volumes, high-lights of the rare book collection include a first edition *David Copperfield* in original wrappers, *Londina Illustrata, Les Oeuvres de Monsieur de Balzac*, and *The Life and Works of Jean Leon Gerome*. The oldest book in the collection is an incomplete copy of *The First Theological Orations of Gregory of Nazianzus* from 1523. The collection also includes selections from two personal libraries, that of Dr. Henry A. Lappin and Bishop William Turner.
